

LUC Professor of Biochemistry Prof. Dr. Krishnajyoti Goswami's Global Recognition for Research on Lead Toxicity and Kidney Health

Lincoln University College (LUC), Malaysia, proudly recognizes the international acclaim received by its esteemed faculty member, Prof. Dr. Krishnajyoti Goswami, Professor of Biochemistry, LUC, for his innovative contributions to medical science, particularly in the domain of lead toxicity and its biological impact on kidney health.

Featured in the July–September 2025 issue of *Techagappe*, a respected diagnostics and medical science publication, Prof. Dr. Goswami's life work was spotlighted in a detailed interview highlighting over 35 years of academic and clinical excellence. His research has significantly advanced global understanding of the subtle yet severe health consequences of lead exposure, especially on the renal system, and continues to inform preventive healthcare and public policy.

Prof. Dr. Goswami has authored over 306 peer-reviewed scientific papers and guided more than 140 postgraduate and doctoral students across institutions in India and Malaysia. His meticulous studies on the synergistic protective effects of Vitamin C (ascorbic acid) against lead-induced kidney damage have garnered recognition from both national and international scientific bodies.

plantation Immunology in 1989. In 2003, he received his D.Sc. in Medical Biochemistry. "I started my career in transplantation immunology. I was a Transplantation Immunology. I was a Transplantation Immunologist at Belle Vue Clinic, Kolkata from 1989 to 1994. There weren't many in that field during the 90's. During that time, the renal failure cases increased in number which made me think about the reason," remembers Prof Krishnajyoti. Curious, he started his research in it and found out that 'lead' was the main culprit in the increasing number of kidney failure cases.

In 1995, he moved to VIMS (Vivekananda Institute of Medical Sciences), Kolkata taking teaching as a career. After 11 years, he joined ESIC Hospital and ODC (EZ), Kolkata as a Specialist in Biochemistry. "I shifted to ESIC Kolkata because it was the only occupational disease centre. The industrial area workers treatment facility was ESIC Medical College, and it was helpful for my research," adds him. In the same year, he completed his Ph.D. in Biochemistry. Lead poisoning was the topic of his Ph.D. In 2015, he moved to Malaysia as a teaching faculty at LUC, Kuala Lumpur. He also holds a patent on discovery of the metabolic derangement associated with lead toxicity that could be partially restored to normalezy with dietary supplementation of Ascorbic acid.

Academic excellence

Prof Krishnajyoti has published six books mostly on lead poisoning in different languages. Amongst his 306 publications, 80% of them are first authorship. Majority of them are related with lead poisoning and the remaining related to lipid profile, medical related errors and diagnostic manufacturing. Around 82 students completed their Ph.D. under him from LUC, Kuala Lumpur and around 60 students are currently under his guidance from Indian universities.

In 2002, Prof Krishnajyoti received Service Award for contribution to environmental research from Asian Pacific Congress of Clinical Biochemistry and Laboratory Medicine (APCCB). In the following year, he was selected by the International Federation of Clinical Chemistry and Laboratory Medicine for Young Scientist Award (International contributor). In 2005, he received an award for the contribution to toxicology research from American Association for Clinical Chemistry.

He also holds the position of General Manager, Quality Assurance and Accredi-

tation, North City Hospital and Neuro Institute, Kolkata from 2013. He was a Consultant (R&D, Production, QC, QA) at Meril Life Sciences India Pvt Ltd, Gujarat from 2015 to 2023.

He was also the Former President of Association of Clinical Biochemists of India in 2008. He was the youngest president of ACBI at the age of 42. "I attained professorship at the age of 38. "During my tenure,

we successfully organized an international ACBI conference in Kolkata, which is still regarded as a landmark event and set the precedent for many such conferences that followed. World Association of Societies of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine (WASPaLM) International conference is hosted by ACBI in Pune this year," says a proud Krishnajyoti. He doesn't associate with any other organisation apart from ACBI. He is also a member of Kolkata Climate Action Network.

Lead, the silent killer

The effects of lead poisoning usually develop slowly, and the symptoms are imperceptible. Lead exposure can have significant health impacts. "Lead replaces your haemoglobin and thus carrying of oxygen is reduced. Also, lead is deposited in your bone leading to fragile nature of your bones. It replaces your calcium and vitamin D," explains Prof Krishnajoti.

He has also been a part of joint venture of Indian government and Bangladesh government along with Showa University, Japan on a study on the lead toxicity of jewellery workers in Bangladesh. "We found that the number of renal failure cases were high among them. In most of the places, the extraction of metals was in the top floors. We urged them to move it to the ground floors as lead is a heavy metal. It will reduce the exposure to them. Apart from that we found that metabolic derangement associated with lead toxicity could be partially re-





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1.0 INTRODUCTION

The hybrid short course on Advancing the Role of Precision Medicine in Community Pharmacy: Applications of Pharmacogenomics, held on 17th April 2025, aimed to provide participants with the knowledge and tools to integrate pharmacogenomic principles into community healthcare. Participants will explore the fundamental role of precision medicine in optimizing drug therapy, analyze real-world case studies showcasing its clinical impact, and identify emerging opportunities and challenges in pharmacogenomics. Participants also will get to understand how the genetics related to the disease. Organized by School of Phamacy, the course attracted professionals, researchers, and students from various fields. The sessions were conducted by Assist. Prof. Dr. Nadiah Syafiqah, Senior Lecturer from School of Pharmacy, Lincoln University College, Ms, Ng Yi Ling, Pharmacist and Dr. Jessica Kaur, Telehealth Doctor, from Alpro Group, experienced professionals and academic experts, to ensure an engaging learning experience. There are 37 participants registered for this short course.



4.0 PARTICIPANT'S FEEDBACK


Out of the 37 participants who attended the short course, **22** provided feedback through the evaluation form given. The feedback reflected the participants' overall satisfaction with the course content, speakers, delivery, facilities and organization.


GENERAL FEEDBACK

1. How satisfied were you with this course?




Majority of the participants (72.7%) are satisfied with the course while only 18.2% rated 4 and 9.1% rated 3. This reflects overall contentment with the short course and its delivery.





68.2% of participants rated the course as 5, indicating its relevance to their job or study interests. However, 22.7.1% rated it a 4, 4.5% rated it a 3 and another 4.5% rated it a 1, suggesting the content may not have fully aligned with their expectations or background/job.


3. Did the course meet your expectations?



The majority of participants (54.5%) felt that the course met or exceeded their expectations, with 36.4% rating it a 4. However, 9.1% rated it a 3, indicating that the course moderately met their expectations. This could be attributed to factors such as course delivery, structure, and duration. Some improvements may be needed in these areas to better align the course with participants' expectations.

CONTENT AND STRUCTURE


1. Was the course content relevant to your needs or interests? 22 responses



54.5% of the participants found that this course is relevant to their needs and interests. 31.8% of them rated a 4 while only 13.6% rated a 3. The lower ratings from this group could be due to a mismatch between the course content and their specific professional or personal needs, possibly due to the course being more tailored to those with a pharmacy background.

2. Was the course content presented clearly?


22 responses



68.2% of participants rated the clarity of the course content highly, with many appreciating the clear presentation by the trainers. However, a small percentage rated it lower, which may suggest that some areas of the content could benefit from more straightforward explanations or examples.

3. Was the course duration sufficient to cover the topics?


22 responses



59.1% and 22.7% of participants rated this aspect positively with a rating of 5 and 4 respectively, suggesting that the course duration was adequate for most. However, 18.2% participants rated 3, indicating that the course duration may not have been sufficient, potentially pointing to the need for more time to cover all topics in detail.


MATERIALS AND RESOURCES

The majority of participants found the provided materials useful, with 63.6% rated a 5. However, 27.3% and 9.1% participants rated a 4 and 3, respectively, possibly indicating that some materials were not detailed as expected, or that more specific resources could have been provided.


2. Were the resources adequate to support your learning? $\ensuremath{\mathtt{22}}$ responses



Majority (68.2%) of the participants rated the resources as adequate, indicating that most participants felt well-supported in their learning through the materials and resources provided. However, for the remaining 31.7%, there may have been concerns regarding the availability or sufficiency of learning aids or supplementary resources.


SPEAKERS PERFORMANCE

1. How would you rate the speakers' knowledge and expertise? 22 responses




Majority of the participants (77.3%) rated a 5, indicating that the speakers are regarded for their strong expertise and knowledge.


3. Did the speakers provide adequate opportunities for questions and interaction? 22 responses



86.4% of the participants rated the trainers a perfect score of 5, indicating that they highly appreciated the opportunities for questions and interaction. 
LEARNING OUTCOMES


2. Has the course enhanced your understanding of the subject? 22 responses


FACILITIES AND HOSPITALITY

1. How would you rate the short course facilities?






3. How satisfied were you with the course organization and logistics? 22 responses

22 responses








1.1 Gender


1.2 Age

1.3. Experience



1.4 Course content




1. Course Content Is Easy to Understand and Relevant to My Practice 8 responses






1.6 Practical activities



3. Practical activities or exercises help me understand diagnostic tests 8 responses




1.7 Course duration




1.10 Application of knowledge

All respondents (100%) expressed interest in participating in advanced courses or related topics in the future, indicating strong enthusiasm for continued learning and professional development


9. Are you interested in participating in advanced courses or related topics in the future? 8 responses

The webinar on "stress awareness and management", held on 30th April 2025, aimed to provide participants with a Stress is the body's natural response to any demand or challenge. Before starting the session, a pretest was conducted for all participants to assess their initial understanding. The Dean of Nursing delivered the inaugural address, providing an overview of stress awareness and highlighting its importance in both personal and professional contexts

The sessions were led by Dr. Smitha Madhavan, who delivered a comprehensive presentation on stress. She began with an introduction to the concept of stress, explaining its definition and relevance in everyday life. The discussion then explored the nature of stress, emphasizing how it can arise from both external pressures and internal responses. Dr. Smitha also categorized the different types of stress, such as acute stress, episodic acute stress, and chronic stress, helping participants understand how each

type can impact individuals differently. Dr. Aruna delivered a concise and informative session focused on the causes of stressors, the symptoms and complications of stress, and the methods of diagnosing stress. She outlined how everyday challenges and significant life events serve as stressors, triggering responses that manifest in both physical and emotional symptoms. Dr.Aruna also highlighted the potential complications that can arise when stress remains unmanaged. Furthermore, she provided an overview of the diagnostic techniques used to assess stress levels, ensuring that participants gained a comprehensive understanding of identifying stress in a clinical setting. Additionally, Dr.Aruna explained the importance of early recognition and effective stress management techniques to maintain overall well-being. By raising awareness, the program aimed to empower individuals with the knowledge and tools needed to cope with stress in a healthy and constructive manner, ultimately promoting better mental, emotional, and physical health.

She concluded with detailed information on complications of unmanaged stress, including anxiety, depression, and burnout, were discussed in detail. Participants developed an awareness of the physical effects of stress, including fatigue, headaches, muscle tension, and sleep disturbances. The session underscored the importance of early recognition of stress and encouraged taking proactive measures for effective management. There are 17 participants registered for this webinar.




4.0 PARTICIPANT'S FEEDBACK


1. Objectives are well defined 12 responses




2. Organization of content 12 responses



3. Stress Awareness presentation & Time Management 12 responses




4. The content is communicated effectively and clearly by presenter ^{12 responses}




5. Voice audibility




6. The audio-visual aids were effective and creative 12 responses




7. Group interaction and involvement





6.0 CONCLUSION

The webinar on "stress awareness & management," held on 30th April 2025, successfully provided participants comprehensive knowledge on stress awareness. Stress is a natural response of the body to any demand or challenge, helping individuals cope with various situations. While it can sometimes be beneficial, such as in motivating action or enhancing performance (known as eustress), excessive or prolonged stress can be harmful. Stress can be categorized into several types, including acute stress, which is short-term and typically caused by recent pressures; chronic stress, which is long-term and arises from ongoing issues like financial problems or unhealthy relationships; and episodic acute stress, experienced frequently due to a highly demanding lifestyle or personality traits like constant worry.

The effects of stress are widespread, impacting physical, emotional, cognitive, and behavioral aspects of life. Physically, it may cause headaches, fatigue, or increased blood pressure. Emotionally, stress can lead to irritability, anxiety, or depression. Cognitively, it may reduce concentration and memory, while behaviorally, it can result in changes like sleep disturbances, poor eating habits, or social withdrawal. If unmanaged, stress can lead to serious complications such as heart disease, weakened immunity, digestive disorders, and mental health conditions like anxiety or depression.

Common symptoms of stress include muscle tension, sleep problems, mood swings, rapid heartbeat, digestive discomfort, and difficulty concentrating. Being aware of these signs is crucial to prevent long-term damage. In conclusion, stress awareness is


